In first-time collaboration, Skirball Cultural Center and Los Angeles Performance Practice co-present the celebrated experimental opera

PANCHO VILLA FROM A SAFE DISTANCE

Probing the mythology surrounding Pancho Villa, the opera illuminates what the legend means in both Mexican and American cultures

LOS ANGELES, CA—Explore the life and legacy of legendary bandit, enigmatic general, and hero of the Mexican Revolution Pancho Villa, with the West Coast premiere of the rousing experimental chamber opera *Pancho Villa from a Safe Distance*. Part of the fifth annual LAX Festival and the Getty's Pacific Standard Time: LA/LA initiative, the performance is co-presented by the Skirball Cultural Center and Los Angeles Performance Practice—in a one-night-only engagement—on Tuesday, October 10, at the Theatre at the Ace Hotel. Featuring music by visionary Austin-based composer Graham Reynolds and a libretto by acclaimed Mexican theater collective Lagartijas Tiradas al Sol, the opera is an insightful examination of the Mexican and Mexican-American impact on the culture and politics of West Texas and the American Southwest.

"We are pleased to partner with the Skirball to bring this compelling work to Los Angeles," remarked Miranda Wright of Los Angeles Performance Practice. "Paying tribute to a legendary revolutionary, *Pancho Villa from a Safe Distance* sonically traverses both Mexican and US perspectives on a complex figure to foster a borderless dialogue about our shared histories. We look forward to audiences feeling inspired to engage in urgent conversations about borders and the limitations of that very concept."

Exploring facts from Villa's biography while also examining the mythology surrounding him, the opera asks what Pancho Villa means to Mexican and American culture and where these meanings intersect and conflict. In addition to Reynolds and Lagartijas Tiradas al Sol, *Pancho Villa from a Safe Distance* brings together director Shawn Sides of Rude Mechs, Kronos Quartet lighting designer Brian Scott, Austin Lyric Opera tenor Paul Sanchez and mezzo-soprano Liz Cass, Grammy Award—winning guitarist/producer Adrian Quesada, backed by a stellar chamber ensemble and remixes by famed Monterrey DJ Toy Selectah. It is performed in English and Spanish with bilingual supertitles.

Featuring hybrid compositional and production techniques and an extensive sound palette, *Pancho Villa from a Safe Distance* is a transnational collaboration that was originally commissioned by Ballroom Marfa (Marfa, TX) and co-commissioned by Fusebox Festival (Austin, TX). The opera is the third installment of *The Marfa Triptych*, Graham Reynolds's genre-hopping trilogy of musical performances.

About Graham Reynolds

Called "the quintessential modern composer" by the *Independent* (UK), Austin-based composer-bandleader-improviser Graham Reynolds creates, performs, and records music for film, theater, dance, rock clubs, and concert halls with a wide range of collaborators across a multitude of disciplines.

Reynolds recently scored Richard Linklater's *Last Flag Flying* starring Steve Carell, Bryan Cranston, and Laurence Fishburne for Amazon Studios; Rude Mechs's *Stop Hitting Yourself* for Lincoln Center Theater; Ballet Austin's *Belle Redux*, and a multi-year commission from Ballroom Marfa, *The Marfa Triptych*. For *Pancho Villa at a Safe Distance*, Reynolds received the 2016 Creative Capital Award.

With the jazz-based and far-reaching Golden Arm Trio, Reynolds has repeatedly toured the country and released four critically acclaimed albums. As Artistic Director of Golden Hornet Composer Laboratory, he has produced more than sixty concerts of world-premiere alt-classical music by more than seventy composers, as well as countless pieces of his own. He is a company member with the internationally acclaimed Rude Mechs theater collective and resident composer with Salvage Vanguard Theater and Forklift Danceworks.

Reynolds's accolades include a Creative Capital Award, an Independent Music Award, two Frederick R. Loewe Music Theatre Awards, nine Austin Critics Table Awards, the John Bustin Award, multiple Austin Chronicle Best Composer wins, and a B. Iden Payne Award. Graham recently released a twelvealbum set on Innova Recordings in early 2017.

About the LAX Festival and the LAX/MEX 2017 Exchange

The annual Los Angeles Exchange [LAX] Festival is produced by Los Angeles Performance Practice (LAPP) and hosts ten days of contemporary performances by Los Angeles-based artists, presented in dialogue with works by guest artists from beyond our borders.
